

Caritas Mission Statement

What is the Mission Statement?

The Mission Statement is a text. This text consists of thoughts, demands and ideas.

The Mission Statement describes the work of Caritas Erzdiözese Wien.

We all commit ourselves to this Mission Statement. The Mission Statement applies to the field of people with disabilities.

Who designed the Mission Statement?

Many people who work at Caritas Erzdiözese Wien developed the Mission Statement together.

Together with people with disabilities. Together with employees.

The Mission Statement declares what is important for all of us.

Caritas Mission Statement

This Mission Statement is to define

- the rights of people with disabilities
- how Caritas campaigns for people with disabilities
- what Caritas has to offer for people with disabilities
- which obligations are assumed by Caritas
- what Caritas demands for people with disabilities

The UN Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities and the Christian view of humanity form the basis for the Mission Statement.

To whom is the Mission Statement addressed?

This Mission Statement is addressed to

- people with disabilities
- employees of Caritas
- friends, relatives and adult guardians
- departments, public authorities and politicians

The 6 parts of the Mission Statement

The Mission Statement consists of 6 parts. Each part has its own color. Each part focuses an important topic.

The symbol of this Caritas Mission Statement is the lighthouse.

These are the 6 parts:

- Disability is not a barrier. Barriers are. This part is blue.
- I'm in. This part is green.
- I'm entitled to this. This part is purple.
- I can do it. This part is red.
- This is private. This part is orange.
- Living a self-determined life. This part is yellow.

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Disability is not a barrier. Barriers are.

What does this mean?

People with disabilities want to live without barriers.

People with disabilities have to overcome many difficulties in their everyday life.

Those difficulties could be: steps in buildings

- complicated language
- prejudices
- poor infrastructure
- badly readable homepages
- if the needs of people with disabilities are not taken into account
- and much more

What do we do? What do we want?

We want to remove such barriers.

We listen to people with disabilities. They show us the difficulties which still exist.

We work together to identify these barriers. We work together to remove these barriers.



These are some examples that are important to us.

- Wheelchair users should be able to move freely anywhere they want.
- Every written document from Caritas should be understandable for everyone.
- Employees are using pictograms, pictures and sign language.



We commit ourselves to

removing barriers in public, as well as in society.









What does this mean?

People with disabilities should be able to take part in everything.

People with disabilities must not be excluded.









What do we do? What do we want?

We want that everyone can shape his own world.

We support people with disabilities, for example:

- when they go shopping
- when they are at a restaurant
- when they are at leisure events
- when they contact family or friends
- when they contact neighbors
- when they join an association
- when they participate at religious events
- when they are in education
- when they search for a job
- and much more





We commit ourselves to

- providing enough jobs for people with disabilities
- giving people with disabilities the chance to take part in everything
- providing inclusive kindergartens, schools and after-school care centers for children and young people with and without disabilities

What does this mean?

People with disabilities have the same rights as all other people.

People with disabilities have a right to protection and safety.

Children and young people with disabilities should grow up in their own family.

We want all people to treat each other with respect and regard.



We support people with disabilities to exercise their rights.

People with disabilities are taken into account when it comes down to decisions.

Representatives represent interests of their colleagues at their workplace and residence.

We create an environment which prevents violence and oppression. We pay attention to non-violent interaction among people. We support people to defend themselves against injustice.

We support families in caring for their children at home.



We commit ourselves to ensuring

that people with disabilities receive

- lifelong education
- support and assistance
- equal pay
- good medical and therapeutic care
- a pension

that people with disabilities live in an environment that supports a non-violent society.

that children and young people with disabilities and their families receive sufficient support.











What does this mean?

People with disabilities have strengths and skills.

People with disabilities have desires and goals.

People with disabilities can and want to assume responsibility.









What do we do? What do we want?

We respect all our different strengths and skills and we use them.

We believe in people with disabilities.

We support people with disabilities, so that they can assume responsibility.

We create possibilities that give people with disabilities the chance to develop, extend and use their strengths and skills.

We ask people with disabilities how they imagine their future. While doing so we give them the support they need and want. While doing so we advise with ideas and suggestions.

We accompany people with disabilities while they achieve their goals.





We commit ourselves to ensuring

- that there is sufficient support for people with disabilities
- that people with disabilities are being accepted by society
- that the media portrays people with disabilities as equal

What does this mean?

People with disabilities have a right to live in privacy.

People with disabilities have a right to sexuality.

People with disabilities have a right to a partnership and the possibility to become parents.

People with disabilities have a right to data protection.












What do we do? What do we want?

We respect that every person needs privacy.



While providing care, we bear in mind all the different needs of children, young people, women and men. We pay attention to their origin and ideology.

While we provide support with the personal hygiene we respect the person's privacy.

We make notes of important information and occurrences. People with disabilities are told what is being written down. Personal information is only written down if it is necessary for their security and health. Employees do not pass on confidential information.





We support people with disabilities in a partnership or relationship. We make sure that people with disabilities are able to live out their sexuality. All people with disabilities receive the sexual educational support they need. We pay attention to their age and their ideology. We advise, accompany and support people with disabilities during their pregnancy and parenthood.

We commit ourselves to

- protecting the data of people with disabilities
- getting authorities to respect the privacy of people with disabilities
- providing support to people with disabilities when they become parents

What do we do? What do we want?

- how and where they want to live

We support people with disabilities while they make decisions. Sometimes people with disabilities need help to make decisions, so they don't harm themselves and others.

We commit ourselves to

- providing different and sufficient offers for people with disabilities
- giving people with disabilities a chance to decide for themselves on where and how they want to live
- giving people with disabilities a chance to decide for themselves on where and as what they want to work.
- giving people with disabilities a chance to choose from different educational opportunities
- giving people with disabilities a chance to choose from different leisure activities
